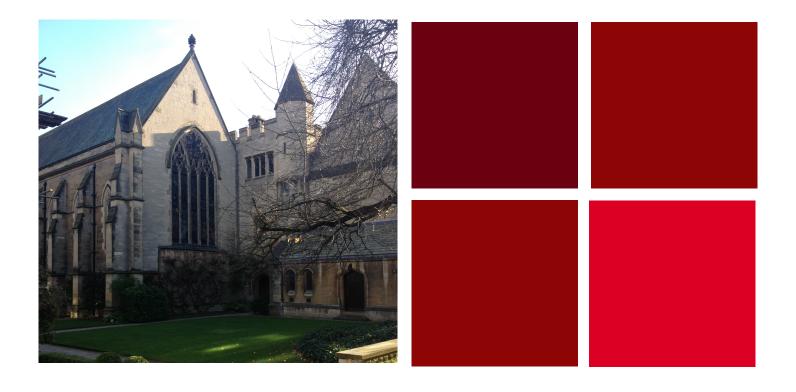


Sports Officer Jakob Vikner

It's on a first – come – first – serve basis, usually reserved via Facebook and there is a £2 fee per match. Also, in Trinity term there will be 5-a-side Cuppers.



Pool

As we have our own pool table, we normally put an HMC team in for the College Cuppers (Cupper is an Oxford term for intercollegiate sports cup). We also try to organiser a pool tournament within college – probably in Hilary term.



Tennis

As of Trinity 2017, we now have an HMC tennis team! (woo!) We can participate in both the tennis league (running over the first two terms) or the college cuppers (in Trinity) – but only if there's enough interest! So please sign up if you're in any way considering! There will also be an opportunity for training sessions organised by the University Tennis Club.



Croquet

Mainly played in Trinity term (when the weather is good enough), croquet is great fun and, combined with Pimm's, it's a great way to spend an afternoon! Gym facilities

HMC doesn't have its own gym, but is one of the colleges that automatically gives you access to the Iffley Sports Ground Gym (the uniwide sports grounds down Iffley Road), as well as free usage of the Four Pillars Spa and Gym!

For other sports, for which there are not enough players at HMC, we usually team up with Wadham College – our next-door neighbours.



Rowing

First term there is a lot of focus on new rowers (novices) and term ends with the Christ Church Regatta – a intercollegiate regatta for novice boats only. It's great fun so give it a try – even if you've never rowed before. The Wadham College Boat Club (WCBC) is great and they do a lot of social stuff too!



Football 11-a-side

Wadham has three men's teams and at least one women's team. Last year we had 5 permanent HMC players in the men's team and we're very welcome. The people in charge of football at Wadham are really nice and are well aware and happy about Harris Mancunians joining. Cuppers and a college league run throughout the first two terms – no 11-a-side in Trinity.

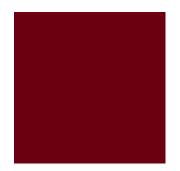












Life at HMC

Food

Harris Manchester is home to some of the best college food across the university, with reasonable prices. College serves 3 meals every day from Monday to Friday, breakfast on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. If you live in college you are signed into every meal and can sign out to get a reimbursement for up 16 meals a term. If you are living out you can sign into meals in advanced (10am meal signup closes for that day). Mondays and Wednesdays we have formal dinners and 3 times a term we have guest nights.

Meals times

Lunch (Monday-Friday) lpm

Dinner (Monday-Friday) 6:45pm

Brunch (Sunday) 10am – 11am

Guest Nights 7:15pm

Please note that our catering staff do provide vegetarian and vegan options, just be sure to register for them on the online sign in form.

Also, if you have any other dietary requirements such as allergies etc. please do get in contact with the kitchen staff and they will do their best to cater to your needs.

Kitchens

Although students living in do not have the option of self-catering there are kitchen facilities which are great for weekend meals. The 3 common space kitchens throughout college are located in Graham Pye, Sykera, and the MCR. Please note that crockery and cooking utensils are not provided. Also, if you do make use of these facilities to be sure to clean up after as they are common spaces.

Scouts (Cleaners)

HMC is fortunate to have a wonderful staff that keep our college looking beautiful and clean. They clean all communal areas Monday-Friday plus student rooms and bathrooms. If scouts cannot gain access to your room for 3 continuous days they will enter to ensure all is well.

Laundry

There is a fully-equipped, self-serve laundry facility in Graham Pye hall. There are two washers and two dryers. You will need to get a laundry card from the bursary with requires a £2 deposit.

Library

Our librarians, Sue and Niall, are incredibly helpful and knowledgeable. The HMC Tate library is one of the most beautiful in Oxford. Recently refurbished, the bookcases are located on the ground floor, while desks are distributed across the lower ground and the mezzanine floors. Harris Manchester has extensive library resources, with the highest book to student ratio of any college. The college can also buy books on request, and offers a generous book grant to all first-year

Sustainability and the environment

HMC is dedicated to reducing our environmental impact and we ask you to help us in our goals in reducing energy use and waste across the college. Each student room has a green bin for recycling and a waste basket. We ask that you recycle as much as you can and take your food waste to the nearest kitchen with food waste receptacle. 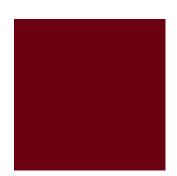

Formals and what to wear when (sub fusc & more)



Formals

During term time (i.e. weeks 1 through 8), formal, three-course dinners are held every Monday and Wednesday. Most colleges at Oxford will hold weekly formals, which can be a great way to meet people and see the rest of the university.

Formals at HMC are a fun and relaxed affair, despite the formality (Latin prayers are said and we stand as the Principal enters and leaves the hall). Wednesday formals are the one night a week that most of the college comes together. Students living out often come in for Wednesday formals to catch up, and it is normal to invite out-of-college friends. The JCR usually fills up after dinner, where conversation and music carry on until late.

Attire is formal; business attire is suitable, and most choose to wear cocktail dresses or lounge suits. Gowns must be worn by students, so it is advisable to buy one before first week. Not that this is not "sub fusc", the cap-and-gown ensemble that must be worn for matriculation and examinations (see below) – only the gown is required for formals.

We also have "informal" formals every Monday, where gowns must be worn, but otherwise it is causal, as per the rest of the week.

Black tie

Can be useful – but not necessary – to have. Several non-compulsory "black-tie" events are held each term, such as Guest Nights (but a black suit, rather than a tuxedo with silk lapels, will suffice).















Sub Fusc

Oxford's academic dress, an outfit also known as "sub fusc", is required to be worn during key milestones of student life at Oxford – including matriculation, examinations, and degree ceremonies. It is undoubtedly an unusual ensemble, and one of the many distinctive things about studying at Oxford.

We recommend that you own a set of academic dress, as the university requires it for the above events and the gown is also to be worn for college formals (see above). Part 1(5) of Harris Manchester's College Handbook, located on the college website, defines academic dress as:

[A] dark suit/black skirt, dark socks/tights and black shoes, white shirt/blouse, white collar and white bowtie/black ribbon, and both cap (mortar board) and gown are worn.

If still unsure, the photos on this page are examples and feel free to ask your college parents or the JCR committee.

There are different gowns according to student status: undergraduates wear "commoner's gown"; graduates wear "advanced student's gown"; and certain scholarship awardees, visiting/exchange students, and all undergraduates who receive a First in their preliminary examinations wear the "scholars gown". Those reading for an advanced degree (or a diploma or certificate) who have graduated from another university may wear their alma mater's gown.

The only pieces of academic dress that you may have trouble finding before you arrive at Oxford are the white bowtie/black ribbon, cap, and appropriate gown. These can be easily bought in Oxford during Fresher's Week from the following shops, which are – all within a 10-minute walk from college:

- The Varsity Shop, 13 Broad Street
- Shepherd & Woodward, 109-113 High Street
- Walters of Oxford, 10 Turl Street
- Ede & Ravenscroft, 119 High Street

The shopkeepers at these outlets should know the kind of gown you require if you tell them your student status. Typically made out of synthetic material, the gowns retail for around £20 for undergraduates and £30 for graduates. There are also options to buy gowns of higher quality, UK manufactured, which retail for around £50 at Ede & Ravenscroft. Our college charities officer will sell cheaper second-hand gowns at Fresher's Week and the college bursary may have spares as well, but these are limited.

Arriving to Oxford and HMC

Undergraduates begin arriving in Oxford as of Sunday of 0th week, October 1st, 2017.

The college address is:

College is located centrally in Oxford and about a 15-minute walk for the train station and 10 minutes from the bus station. If you plan to drive be aware there is limited street parking throughout Oxford and limit car access, so please plan ahead for street restrictions and construction happening within Oxford. Please ensure you have notified Vicky Lill about your expected time of arrival. On Sunday from 9am onwards there will be students within the main entrance to welcome you and show you to your room. If you plan on arriving outside of working hours you will be greeted by either our night porter or a vacation porter (this does need to be arranged in advance via Vicky Lill).

Travel within Oxford

Cars

Parking and car use in central Oxford is very limited. There are NO parking facilities at college for students. If you are commuting into college there are 5 Park and Ride locations surrounding Oxford, where you can park your car and then grab a bus into town. Cycling

Cycling is the quickest way around! Feel free to bring your own bike or you can purchase one

in Oxford. There are bike racks in college that you can use, just be sure to get a free bike tag

from the bursary. We recommend you wear a helmet and hi-visibility clothing. Note it is law

that you have bike lights should you be biking during non-daylight hours. Bike theft is common

in Oxford so be sure to get a sturdy lock and always lock your bike up!

Walking

This is the easiest way to get around central Oxford. It only takes 5 minutes to get to the heart

of the city from college and most faculty libraries. There are also nice walking paths for

leisure such as University Parks, Christ Church Meadows, and the Botanic Gardens all within

10 minutes of college.

Buses

The main bus companies in Oxford are the Oxford Bus Company and Stagecoach. Fares

start with singles outside of the city for £2, and you can generally get a return ticket within

Oxfordshire for about £7.

Taxis

There are many companies in Oxford if you need a cab. The easiest is the 001 app to order
